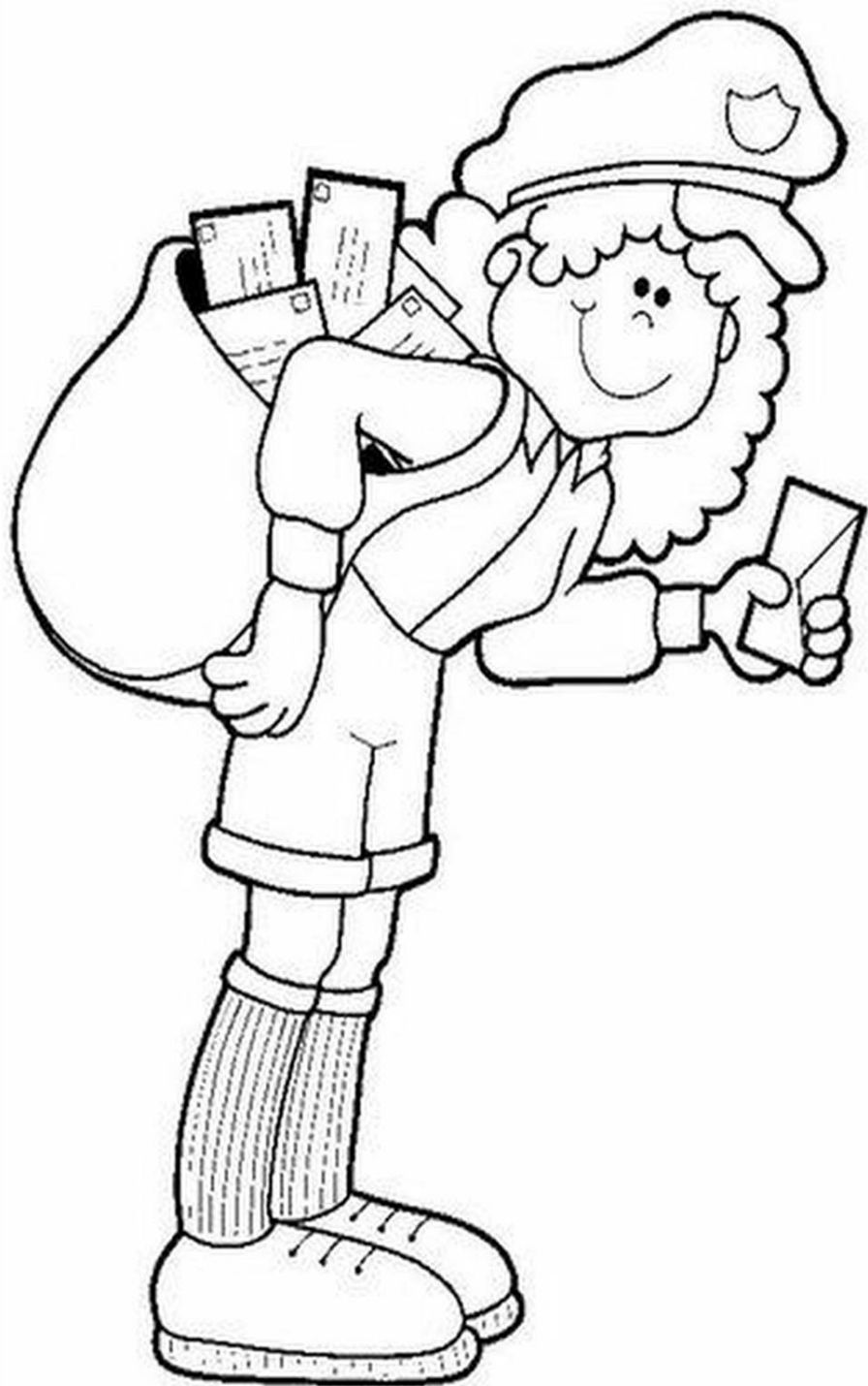

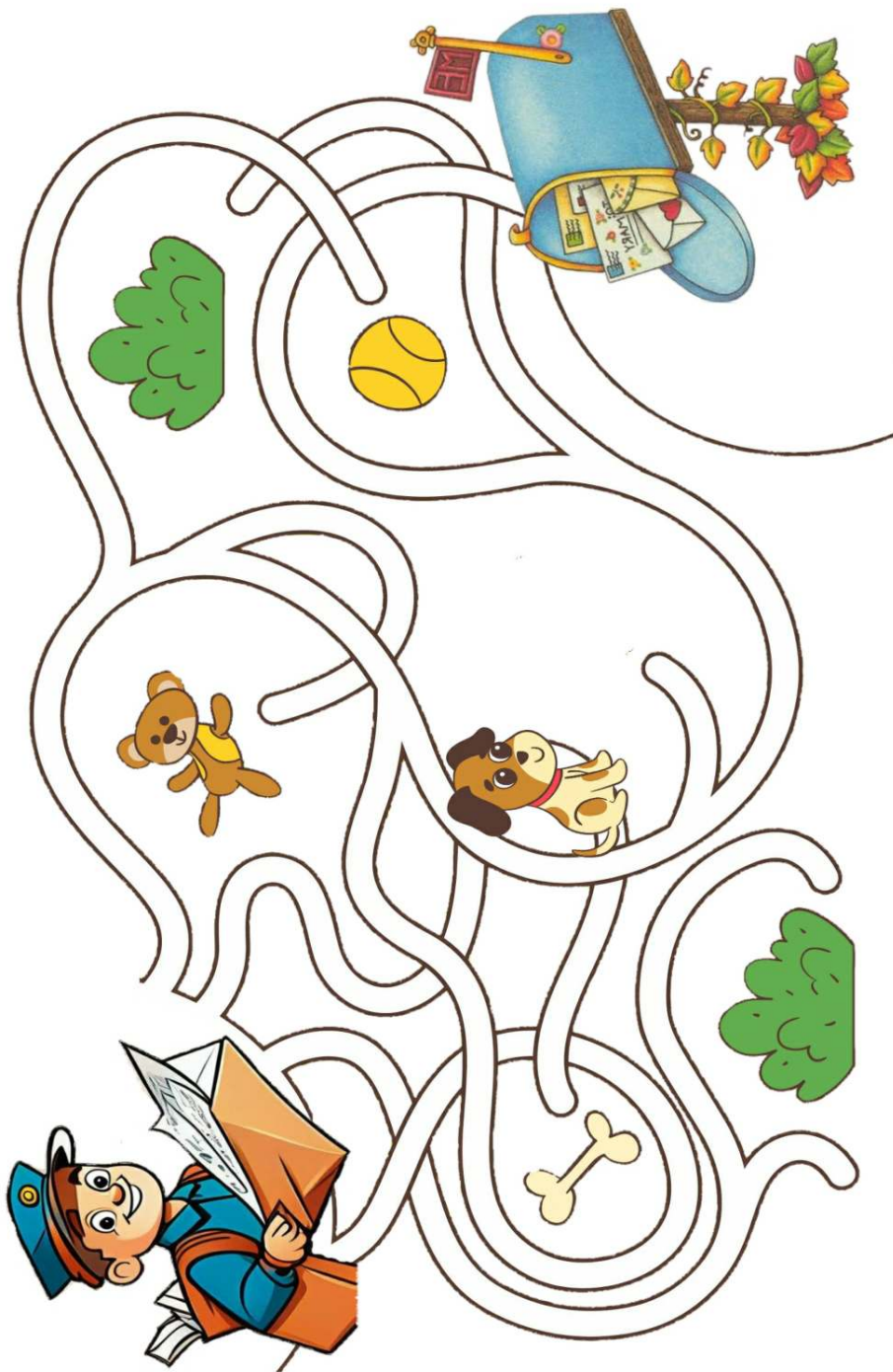

The city is big enough to have two major post offices and several smaller post offices to assist residents of the area. Texas has 26,640 postal employees and 77 of them are in the Abilene area. They may drive or walk their routes or work in one of the post offices. Abilene has 90 trucks, so you are always seeing a postal truck go about here and there.



With this many trucks, carriers can always have a vehicle to get to where they need to go. There are specialty trucks for jobs like setting up the locks on mailboxes or doing rural routes.

Yes, there are both male and female carriers.

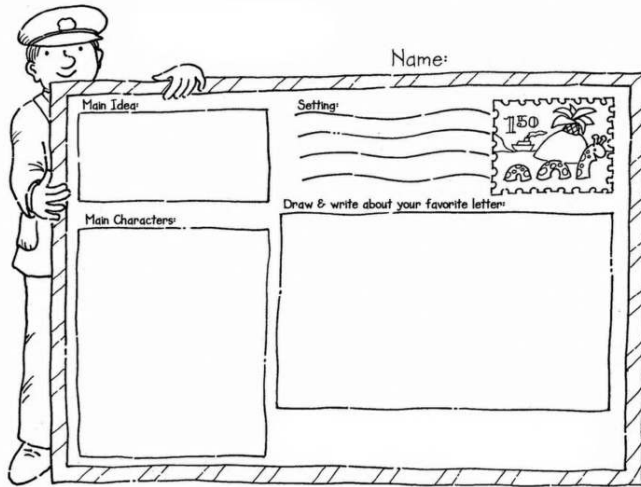
I like watching the postmen here in Abilene because they are so cheery and helpful. They are always getting the job done with the spirit and tradition of the legendary postal carriers
